Sight, sound

Jon Harvey and Joemy Wilson will return to Lehigh County Community College Thursday to perform "Mime Musica," at 8 p.m. in the Science Technology Building, Room 30.

The mime show was rescheduled after bad weather conditions forced its cancellation on Jan. 26.

The two artists have combined their talents to create an unusual show. Joemy Wilson provides songs and background music played on the Appalachian Mountain dulcimer. Her original compositions blend contemporary rock, folk and classical styles in music that has personal and also universal messages.

Jon Harvey produces no sound in the show. He has developed his own non-verbal language into a distinct art form. His mime artistry began with his desire as a child to communicate with his deaf-mute aunt. Harvey has performed at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, was the first mime to be awarded a grant by the New York State Council on the Arts, and the first mime to be featured in a PBS special, "Portrait of A Mime."

The pair have performed on three continents in settings ranging from jet flights to college campuses and museums. Cost of the show is \$1.50 for the public and \$.75 for students.



Metric miles

The Emmaus Road Runners are progressive thinkers.

The group will sponsor its first event next Sunday — the first 10 Kilometer Run.

The event will begin at the Emmaus High School at 2 p.m. and follow a course of paved roads and moderate hills through the streets of Emmaus, the Little Lehigh Acres, River Bend and Country Club Roads, Harrison St. and back to the high school.

Awards will be made to the top five finishers in each of the five classes, which are open women's class, high school under age 18, and open men's classes, ages 19-29, 30-39 and over 40. Ribbons will be awarded to all participants.

Registration will take place at the high school from noon until 1:30 p.m. the day of the race. Entry fee is \$2.50. Participants may pre-register for \$2 by contacting Charles Norelli, 717 Liberty St., Emmaus, Pa. 18049, or call 967-1528.

Showers and lockers will be made available to entrants at the high school. The borough is providing police escort and traffic control along the well marked course.

If you're not up for the race, you're welcome to join the Emmaus Road Runners at 10 a.m. Sunday mornings for informal local jogging. The group meets at the Emmaus Junior High School and would welcome any runners, regardless of shape or size. The group currently has about 20 members.

Inn reopening

Musket salutes, a film and a new sign unveiling will mark the 1978 spring reopening of the Sun Inn, 564 Main St., Bethlehem, 1-4 p.m. next Saturday.

The public is invited to attend the ceremonies. A film, "Future for the Past," about historic preservation in England, will be shown at 2 and 3 p.m. in the inn. The gift shop in the inn will reopen and refreshments will be served. The musket salute will be sounded by the Second Pennsylvania Regiment.

The spring opening is the first in a series of programs to be offered each month by the Sun Inn Preservation Association through the fall. Tentative programs include a strawberry festival, historic speakers and films, commemorative dinners to Asa Packer and Count Pulaski, and craft displays.

Inside the inn are architectural drawings and studies showing what changes were made to the structure since it was built in 1758 by the Moravians. Cutaway sections expose portions of the original structure.

During the time the inn was scheduled for demolition in the 1960s, the Sun Inn Preservation Association was formed to save the historic structure. The group eventually plans to restore the building to its original appearance.
